From today (Wednesday 2<sup>nd</sup> December) we will move out of lockdown and back into our tier system, but we will notice very little change here at Newdigate School as we continue to follow our current risk assessment. On Sunday evening the government also issued guidance for the Christmas period that included the possibility of parents attending School nativity plays in Tier 2 areas, as long as the appropriate measures were in place. Given the very short notice and the obvious practical limitations in doing this (small socially distanced

audiences, minimising movement across classes not to mention the cleaning that would need to follow) we have decided that we will continue with our current plans and spread the Christmas joy safely. This is likely to be mirrored in other schools but we have not had the opportunity to discuss this locally. I am sure you understand the reasoning behind this choice.

Watching the world react to so many unprecedented challenges, it has become clear that views and opinions are so often divided and people cannot always appreciate or agree with the perspective of others. We have been using our value to guide our responses as adults and talking to our children about this through our school value. We have learnt that it is during these difficult times that it is **even more important** that we not only hope for **peace**, but make it our job to create and **seek** it, to be **'peacemakers'**, to work together to resolve difficult issues, to support those in need, to deliver a caring word or show a kind smile to those around us.

### Anti-Bullying Week 2020

In the middle of November, we participated in **Anti-Bullying Week**. Across the nation schools thought about how important it was to 'Unite Against Bullying', as we do each year. Of course, this is a subject that should be talked about not just for a week. It is our view that on-going discussions about how to make good choices (here it is always related to our Bee Rules) is the foundation for creating an ethos that makes bullying much less likely. We will of course always support children who fall out with each other and help them resolve friendship issues, but it is important that we use this opportunity to highlight the difference between them.
