

During the Autumn term, up to Christmas, the children will be learning the following skills:

Maths	Literacy
We will be enjoying developing our maths skills by providing practical opportunities both in the inside and outside classroom through playing maths games, shape hunts, building models, experimenting with capacity and weight. • recognising and ordering numbers 0-10 (extending	The children will shortly be commencing with wordless books before reading books with words. We will be enjoying a rich array of books, re-telling and re-enacting familiar stories. • Create a rhyming string of 3 words
 to 20 if appropriate) Counting on from different numbers Counting backwards from different numbers Counting objects 1:1 to 10 (extending to 20 if appropriate) Subitise to 4/5 (e.g. recognise there are 4 objects without having to count them.)
